20	1. Joanne Wenzel (Complainant) brings this Statement of Issues solely in her official		
21	capacity as the Chief of the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education, Department of		
22	Consumer Affairs.		
23	2. On or about May 14, 2013, the Burea	au for Private Postsecondary Education received	
24	an Application for Renewal of Approval to Operate from Stella Adler Academy of Acting		
25	(Respondent and/or the Institution). On or about May 7, 2013, Stella Adler Academy of Acting		
26	certified under penalty of perjury to the truthfulness of all statements, answers, and		
27	representations in the application. The Bureau denied the application on March 16, 2016. On or		
28	about July 8, 2016, the Bureau issued an amended notice of denial of the application.		

	<u>JURISDICTION</u>
3.	This Statement of Issues is brought before the Director of the Department of
Consumer	Affairs (Director) for the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education, under the
authority o	f the following laws. All section references are to the Education Code unless
otherwise	indicated.
4.	Code section 94886 states that:
9480	Except as exempted in Article 4 (commencing with Section 94874) or in pliance with the transition provisions in Article 2 (commencing with Section 12), a person shall not open, conduct, or do business as a private postsecondary ational institution in this state without obtaining an approval to operate under thiter.

- 5. Code section 94891 states that:
- (a) The bureau shall adopt by regulation the process and procedures whereby an institution may obtain a renewal of an approval to operate.
- (b) To be granted a renewal of an approval to operate, the institution shall demonstrate its continued capacity to meet the minimum operating standards.
- (c)(1) An institution that is denied renewal of an approval to operate may file an appeal in accordance with the procedures established by the bureau pursuant to Section 94888.
- (2) An institution that has filed an appeal of a denial of a renewal application may continue to operate during the appeal process, but must disclose in a written statement, approved by the bureau, to all current and prospective students, that the institution's application for renewal of approval to operate was denied by the bureau because the bureau determined the application did not satisfy the requirements to operate in California, that the institution is appealing the bureau's decision, and that the loss of the appeal may result in the institution's closure.
- (3) If the bureau determines that the continued operation of the institution during the appeal process poses a significant risk of harm to students, the bureau shall make an emergency decision pursuant to its authority provided in Section 94938.

STATUTORY PROVISIONS1

6. Code section 94910 states, in pertinent part, as follows:

Except as provided in subdivision (d) of Section 94909 and Section 94910.5, prior to enrollment, an institution shall provide a prospective student with a

(c) An institution that has been granted an approval to operate by means

- request that an institution document compliance with the standards set forth in the Act and this Division to obtain and maintain an approval to operate."
 - California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 71745, states as follows: 13.
 - (a) The institution shall document that it has at all times sufficient assets and financial resources to do all of the following:
 - (5) Pay all operating expenses due within 30 days.
 - (6) Maintain a ratio of current assets to current liabilities of 1.25 to 1.00 or greater at the end of the most recent fiscal year when using generally accepted accounting principles, or for an institution participating in Title IV of the federal Higher Education Act of 1965, meet the composite score requirements of the U.S. Department of Education. For the purposes of this section, current assets does not include: intangible assets, including goodwill, going concern value, organization expense, startup costs, long-term prepayment of deferred charges, and non-returnable deposits, or state or federal grant or loan funds that are not the property of the institution but are held for future disbursement for the benefit of students. Unearned tuition shall be accounted for in accordance with general accepted accounting principles.
 - California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 74112, provides in relevant part²:
 - (c) Reporting periods:
 - (1) An Annual Report shall include data for all educational programs as defined in section 94837 of the Code for the previous one calendar year.
 - (2) A Performance Fact Sheet shall be current and available not later than August 1st, and shall report data for the previous two calendar years based upon the 'number of students who began program' or the 'number of graduates,' as defined in subdivision (b), for each reported calendar year.
 - (d) Completion Rates. Reporting of completion rates for an institution's Annual Report and Performance Fact Sheet shall include, for each educational program, the number of students who began program as defined in subdivision (b), the number of students available for graduation, number of graduates, and completion rate(s). An optional column may be added to include completion rate data for students

completing within 101-150% of the published program length. For an institution reporting completion data pursuant to section 94929(b) of the Code, completion data shall be separately reported for each program. The Performance Fact Sheet shall disclose, if true, that the completion data is being reported for students completing within 150% of the published program length, and that data is not being separately reported for students completing the program within 100% of the published program length.

Completion rates shall be included in the Performance Fact Sheet in a format substantially similar to the chart below, including the footnoted information below (dates, numbers, and other data shown are for example only):

- 1 'Number of Students Who Began Program' is the number of students who began the program who are scheduled to complete the program within the reporting calendar year.
- 2 'Students available for graduation' is the number of students who began program minus the number of 'Students unavailable for graduation,' which means those students who have died, been incarcerated, or called to active military duty.
- 3 'Graduates' is the number of students who completed the program within 100% of the published program length.
- 4 'Completion Rate' is the number of Graduates divided by the Number of Students Available for Graduation.
- 5 '150% Graduates' is the number of students who completed the program within 101-150% of the published program length.
- 6 '150% Completion Rate' is the number of students who completed the program in the reported calendar year within 101-150% of the published program length divided by the Number of Students Available for Graduation in the published

- 20. On or about March 16, 2016, the Bureau issued a notice of denial of application.
- 21. On or about April 1, 2016, Respondent sent the Bureau a letter requesting an administrative hearing to appeal the denial of its application for a renewal of its license.
- 22. Between on or about approximately June 2016 and July 7, 2016, additional documents were submitted by Respondent to the Bureau which were reviewed by the Bureau.
- 23. On or about July 8, 2016, the Bureau issued an amended notice of denial of the application.

FIRST CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Financial Resources and Statements)

- 24. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Code sections 94891, subdivision (b) and 94928, subdivision (c), in that:
- (a) The Institution failed to provide current financial statements which had been reviewed and/or audited by a CPA, in accordance with the generally accepted accounting principles established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, in violation of California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 74115, subdivision (b) and 71475, subdivision (e).
- (b) The Institution's financial documents submitted during the application process do not document that the Institution has sufficient assets and financial resources pursuant to Section 71745, subdivision (a)(5), nor do they meet the necessary ratios of current assets to current liabilities of 1.25 to 1.00 or greater, pursuant to Section 71745, subdivision (a)(6). Based upon the financial documents submitted for the year ending September 30, 2015, the Institution's current ratio is 0.37.
 - (c) Respondent incorporates by reference herein Paragraphs 16-23, above.

SECOND CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Change of Institutional Name)

25. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Code sections 94891, subdivision (b) and 94928, subdivision (c), in that the Institution is approved to operate under the name "Stella Adler Academy of Acting", but the application received on May 14, 2013 documents inconsistencies in the use of the Institution's name through their corporation name (i.e. "the Stella

Adler Theatre"), enrollment agreements (i.e. "Stella Adler Los Angeles Academy of Acting and Theatre"), U.S. application (i.e. "Stella Adler – Los Angeles"), school catalog, School Performance Fact Sheets and advertising, in violation of California Code of Regulations, title 5, sections 71630. Respondent incorporates by reference herein Paragraphs 16-23, above.

THIRD CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(School Performance Fact Sheet)

- 26. Respondent's application is subject to denial under Code section 94932, as follows:
- a. Respondent reports in its School Performance Fact Sheet (SPFS) for 2013 that 31 students were available for graduation, 31 students graduated and the Completion Rate is 57%. The Completion Rate is incorrect and is not calculated in accordance with the provisions of California Code of Regulation, title 5, section 74112, subdivision (d).
- b. Respondent violated Code sections 94910, subdivision (a), 94928, subdivision (c) and 94929, and California Code of Regulation, title 5, section 74112, subdivision (d), in that the Institution's SPFS for 2014 does not include data for Students Available for Graduation, Graduates and Completion Rate. These were left blank by the Institution.
- c. For the SPFS for 2013/2014, the Placement Rates do not include the definitions for footnote six Graduates Employed in the Field an Average of less than 32 hours per week, and footnote seven Graduates Employed in the Field at least 32 hours per week, in violation of California Code of Regulation, title 5, section 74112, subdivision (e).
- d. Respondent failed to include in its SPFS a statement informing the reader where they may obtain from the institution a list of employment positions determined to be within the field for which a student received education and training for the calculation of job placement rates, in violation of Code section 94910, subdivision (f)(2).
- e. Respondent failed to include in its SPFS a statement informing the reader of where he or she may obtain from the Institution a list of the objective sources of information used to substantiate the salary disclosure, in violation of Code section 94910, subdivision (f)(3).
- f. In Respondent's SPFS received on June 17, 2016, the tables for On-Time Completion Rates and Students Completing After Published Program Length (101-150%)

Completion Rates) are confusing and labeled incorrectly. Also, the SPFS submitted incorrectly documents in the Institution's header for the reported years of 2016/2017. The correct reporting years should be for 2013/2014. Further, the fact sheet tables document the years 2014/2015. The reporting years should be for 2013/2014. This is a violation of Code sections 94910, subdivision (a), 94928, subdivision (c), 94929 and California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 74112, subdivision (d).

- g. In Respondent's SPFS received on June 17, 2016, the Institution's header incorrectly documents the reported years of 2016/2017. The correct reporting years should be for 2013/2014. Further, the fact sheet tables document the years 2014/2015, when the reporting years should be for 2013/2014. This is a violation of California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 74112, subdivision (c)(2).
- h. Respondent's SPFS received on June 17, 2016 documents the actual reporting years as 2014/2015. The 2013 reporting year is not documented on the fact sheet. This is a violation of California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 74112, subdivision (c)(2).
 - 27. Respondent incorporates by reference herein Paragraphs 16-23, above.

FOURTH CAUSE FOR DENIAL OF APPLICATION

(Student Performance Data)

- 28. Respondent's application is subject to denial because the Student Performance Data which was submitted to the Bureau does not include all of the minimum requirements, pursuant to California Code of Regulations, title 5, section 74112, subdivision (h). In particular, the supporting data does not include an explanation of the colored areas or abbreviations used.
 - 29. Respondent incorporates by reference herein Paragraphs 16-23, above.

PRAYER

WHEREFORE, Complainant requests that a hearing be held on the matters herein alleged, and that following the hearing, the Director of the Department of Consumer Affairs issue a decision:

1. Denying the application of Stella Adler Academy of Acting for an Application for Renewal of Approval to Operate, Institution Code No. 1919351; and
