Admission

The Therapeutic Massage Program is open to all interested persons age 18 or over who are high school graduates or have a successful passing score on the ability to benefit exam. There is no entrance testing requirement. Cypress does not provide English as a second language instruction. Cypress does not offer ESL classes or translators. Cypress does not offer distance educational programs or on-line educational programs. All classes are in English only. The student must have the ability to read and write English at the level of a graduate of an American high school as demonstrated by the possession of a high school diploma, GED or passage of the California high school proficiency exam. Students may submit transcripts from a high school, community college or 4 year college as an assessment of their potential attendance at Cypress courses.

Cypress admits students from other countries, but no visa services are provided and Cypress will vouch for student status, but not any associated charges. 2. You were enrolled at an institution or a location of the institution within the 120 day period before the closure of the institution or location of the institution, or were enrolled in an educational program within the 120 day period before the program was discontinued.

3. You were enrolled at an institution or a location of the institution more than 120 days before the closure of the institution or location of the institution, in an educational program offered by the institution as to which the Bureau determined there was a significant decline in the quality or value of the program more than 120 days before closure.

4. The institution has been ordered to pay a refund by the Bureau but has failed to do so.

5. The institution has failed to pay or reimburse loan proceeds under a federal student loan program as required by law, or has failed to pay or reimburse proceeds received by the institution in excess of tuition and other costs.

6. You have been awarded restitution, a refund, or other monetary award by an arbitrator or court, based on a violation of this chapter by an institution or representative of an institution, but have been unable to collect the award from the institution.

A student whose loan is revived by a loan holder or debt collector after a period of noncollection may, at any time, file a written application for recovery from STRF for the debt that would have otherwise been eligible for recovery. If it has been more than four (4) years since the action or event that made the student eligible, the student must have filed a written application for recovery within the original four (4) year period, unless the period has been extended by another act of law.

However, no claim can be paid to any student without a social security number or a taxpayer identification number.

Facility, Equipment and Student Services

Cypress is located in downtown Santa Cruz above Logos Bookstore in a large and well-maintained building.

Two large, clean, light-filled classrooms, with 2 restrooms are available for classes. Massage tables are available for student's use while in class.

Both a projector and projection screen are available for power point presentations. A skeleton is available to students in the classroom.

Reference books, including but not limited to the following are available in the classroom for student use. <u>Trail Guide to the Body</u> by Biel, <u>Pathology for Massage</u> Therapists by Werner, Anatomy flash cards, anatomical charts of the

musculoskeletal, skeletal and nervous systems, MBLEx study guides.

A large whiteboard is available for teacher and student use during class.

Filtered water is available for students.

Public transportation is available in front of the school.

Ample free, off-street parking is available at the school.

Student handouts of material, when needed, are provided to the students for each class at no cost to the students.

Student services: A whiteboard listing of job openings and inquiries from local businesses is available for students to look at whenever they are at school.

Library

Cypress does not offer a library. There are no library services available at Cypress.

Housing information

Cypress does not have any dormitory facilities.

The school has no responsibility to find or assist a student in finding housing. The approximate range of cost of housing is \$500-700/ for room and \$1000-1400/month for house. Cypress has no responsibility to find or assist a student in finding housing.

Student records

Cypress retains student records for 5 years and transcripts are kept permanently. Students shall contact the Director, Larry Bernstein, in order to get a copy of their records or transcript.

Rules of Operation

Attendance Policy

Course attendance is documented daily and all clock hours are included in the scheduled start and finish dates and times of each class in any course. Classes start on time and important information is presented at the beginning of class. The Institution requires all students to attend classes in each course on a regular and consistent basis in order to develop the skills and attitudes necessary to compete in the highly competitive labor market. Because much of each class is conducted in a hands-on environment, attendance is critical to proper skill building. Actual attendance time is expressed in terms of clock hours.

Clock hours will be rounded off to the nearest 1/4-hour. It is important to arrive on time or before the beginning of the scheduled class or lab period. A 96% total attendance record of the Certified Massage Therapist 520-hour Program is required to graduate. Make-up hours are required if a student falls below the 96% attendance record.

Missed time due to tardiness or leaving a class early will be recorded and students will be required to make-up that time by paying for and attending a make-up class. Any student who misses more than 15 minutes of a 4 hour class in any program, or more than 30 minutes of a 8 hour class in any program, will not be given transcript credit for that missed class time until the student attends a make-up class for the time they missed

Applicants for CAMTC certification must attend 500 supervised hours total with 100 of those hours satisfying CAMTC specified subject. Cypress Health Institute will record any absences and track and record all make-up sessions to insure student completion of the required hours mentioned above.

Make-up Hours Procedures:

Students must make up missed hours. Students are required to attend scheduled make-up classes at the student's current program level. Students will be charged by the instructor for their make-up session time.

Attendance and/or graduation from a California Massage Therapy Council approved school does not guarantee certification by CAMTC. Applicants for certification shall meet all requirements as listed in California Business and Professions Code section 4600 et. seq

Cypress Health Institute uses a pass/fail system of evaluation. A student passes upon demonstrated proficiency in and knowledge of the area of study taught in the program.

Completion and graduation requirements

Cypress Health Institute uses a pass/fail system of evaluation. A student passes upon demonstrated proficiency in, and knowledge of, the area of study taught in the program.

Such demonstration will be evidenced through the practical application of skills at the end of each course. A student must complete each course by the end date of that course. If, due to illness or emergency, a student cannot demonstrate proficiency in a course at the time that any course ends, then a student is allowed 3 months after the completion date of a course to demonstrate proficiency in that course. If a student fails to meet these requirements, then the student can request, in writing, to demonstrate proficiency after the 3 month period. This written request may be by postal mail or email.

To complete and graduate from the Certified Massage Therapist 520-hour Program, a student must attend at least 500 clock hours of classes in the program. A 96% total attendance record of the Certified Massage Therapist 520-hour Program is required to graduate. Make-up hours are required if a student falls below the 96% attendance record.

Students must complete all class assignments to graduate. Students must pass all class assessments to graduate.

Applicants for CAMTC certification must attend 500 supervised hours total with 100 of those hours satisfying CAMTC specified requirements in core subjects (64 hours of Anatomy & Physiology, 13 hours of Contraindications, 18 hours of Business & Ethics, 5 hours of Health & Hygiene). Cypress Health Institute will record any absences and track and record all make-up sessions to insure student completion of the required hours mentioned above. Students must make up missed hours. Students are required to attend scheduled make-up classes at the student's current program level. Students will be charged by the instructor for their make-up session time.

Attendance and/or graduation from a California Massage Therapy Council approved school does not guarantee certification by CAMTC. Applicants for certification shall meet all requirements as listed in California Business and Professions Code section 4600 et. seq."

Hygiene, dress code and draping policies

Students are required to be clean and neat while attending all classes at Cypress Health Institute. Bodies and clothing should be scent free during class times. Professional draping techniques are taught and used for all classes requiring exposure of client body parts and skin.

Certificate of Completion

When a student successfully completes all aspects of the program the student will receive a Certificate of Completion from the Cypress Health Institute. Cypress does not offer any degree programs.

Student Conduct: Probation and Dismissal Policy

Disrespectful, disruptive or unsafe behavior may be cause for probation and/or dismissal. A student who behaves in this manner three times will be put on probation for a period of two weeks. If the behavior occurs again during this period, the student will be dismissed. If the behavior recurs after the two week probation, the student will also be dismissed.

Student Complaint Procedure

A student or any member of the public may file a complaint about the institution with the Bureau for Private Postsecondary Education by calling (888) 370-7589 toll free or by completing a complaint form, which can be obtained on the bureau's internet web site www.bppe.ca.gov.

The school director, Larry Bernstein, is designated to receive and resolve student complaints. A student may lodge a complaint by communicating verbally to the director in person at the school, 1119 Pacific Avenue, #300, Santa Cruz, CA 95060. The Director is available 9:00 A.M. - 5:00 P.M. Monday through Friday. A student may also file a complaint in writing to the Director, Larry Bernstein, at the school (P.O. After receiving a complaint, Cypress shall, within ten days of receiving the complaint, provide the student with a written response, including a summary of the school's investigation and disposition of the complaint.

Larry Bernstein will be regularly accessible to all students during their time of study at Cypress Health Institute. As director, Larry Bernstein has the duty to investigate complaints thoroughly, including interviewing all people and reviewing all documents that pertain to the complaint. He shall also record a summary of the complaint, its disposition and reasons. He shall place a copy of the summary, and other related documents, in the student's file and make an appropriate entry in the log of the student's complaints.

The director will implement reasonable policies to avoid similar complaints in the future and communicate directly to any person regarding a complaint. The director may compromise or resolve the complaint in any reasonable way. If the complaint is valid and not resolved within thirty days after it was first made by the student, the director will notify the Council and authorities of the complaint investigation and resolution or lack or resolution. The director may also reject the complaint if, after investigation, it is determined to be unfounded. A student's

participation in the complaint procedure and disposition of a student's complaint shall not limit or waive any of the student's rights.

Leave of Absence

Submitting a written request, a student may request a leave of absence from the program for up to one year. Personal health issues and family emergencies are reasons a leave of absence may be approved. The student will have one year from the date of the written request to return and complete the program.

Financial aid

There is currently no financial aid if any kind available for students through the school.

Cypress does not offer any federal or state financial aid programs.

If a student receives a loan from other sources to meet their tuition, then the student is required to repay the full amount of that loan plus interest, less the amount of any refund.

This course is catered towards bodyworkers of all types who want to further their knowledge of the body. We will explore the various muscles and anatomical landmarks using palpation and other methods to further develop your understanding of the amazing human body. Course Description

Students will learn the basic principles of Human Physiology, and the general properties and functions of the internal environment. The course covers the nervous, musculoskeletal, cardiovascular, respiratory, gastrointestinal, renal, reproductive, endocrine, and sensory systems of the human body.

Syllabus

Title: Physiology

Course Instructor: Christian Real CMT

Course Objectives

By the end of the course the students should have a basic understanding of the nervous, musculoskeletal, cardiovascular, respiratory, gastrointestinal, renal, reproductive, endocrine, and sensory systems of the human body. The objectives of this course are to teach students the principles of human physiology as it relates to massage therapy. This includes but is not limited to the following:

> Understanding homeostasis, metabolism, feedback loops, cell transport, osmosis, diffusion, basic cell anatomy, and organization of the body from cells to tissues to organs to organ systems to organisms

as well as the different tissue types- nervous, epithelial, connective, muscle.

- Understanding of the basic anatomy and function of the nervous and endocrine systems, action potentials, "all or none" mechanism, and chief neurotransmitters and their functions, divisions of the nervous system including CNS, PNS, ANS, and sympathetic/parasympathetic.
- Understanding the definition of a hormone, chief hormones and their functions, chief endocrine glands, feedback loops in the endocrine system.
- Understanding of the special senses- basic anatomy of sensory organs, and discussion of the senses of vision, hearing, taste, smell, and different types of receptors for each, as well as specific cranial nerves involved.
- Understanding the integumentary system- basic anatomy and function of the skin
- Knowledge of the basic anatomy and function of a muscle, types of muscle tissue- smooth, striated, cardiac. Sliding filament model of muscle contraction. Muscle contraction and the skeleton, types of muscle contraction- concentric, eccentric, isometric
- Knowledge of the skeletal: basic anatomy of the bones, types of bones, function of the skeleton
- Knowledge of the basic anatomy and functions of the heart, blood and circulatory system. Pathway of blood through the heart, cardiac conduction system.
- Understanding of the basic anatomy and function of the lymph system
- Knowledge of the basic anatomy and function of the respiratory system, including the respiratory tree, alveoli, and muscles of inspiration and expiration
- Knowledge of the basic anatomy and function of the Kidneys and Urinary System. Production of urine- filtration, absorption, secretion. Regulation of the bodies' pH
- Knowledge of the basic anatomy and function of the digestive system. Pathway of food through the digestive tract, chief digestive enzymes and their functions.
- Knowledge of the basic anatomy and function of the male and female reproductive systems. Chief reproductive hormones and their

influences. Changes of the female body during menstruation and pregnancy

Chinese Medical Theory Syllabus

The Chinese Medical Theory class provides a basic foundation of the principles of Asian Bodywork. This knowledge will help the student successfully understand Asian bodywork. This class will present basic principles of Chinese Medical Theory.

Chinese Medical Theory is 40 hours. Classes are from 9-12 AM and 1-6 PM Handouts of relevant material are provided to the students. See Appendix outline of subject matter: Concepts of balance: yin and yang

The 12 essential channels or meridians Location of the meridians on the body Which channels go where and what do they do Group discussion is the primary mode of instruction. The teacher will also demonstrate information, such as location of channels on the body, and students will practice locating them on each other. The teacher evaluates proficiency as the students practice. There is no exam for this course.

Anatomy Syllabus

The anatomy class provides basic understanding of human anatomy. It includes skeletal as well as muscular gross anatomy.

The goal of this course is to give the student a working knowledge of basic skeletal and muscular anatomy.

Anatomy class is 50 hours. Classes are from 9-12 AM and from 1-6 PM Handouts with relevant information are given to the students. See appendix.

Lecture and group discussions are used in this class. The teacher talks about the issues for students and then leads them through a group discussion. A summary is then presented to the students. The teacher evaluates proficiency as the students discuss the material. There is no exam for this course.

Clinic

Clinic is an opportunity for students to practice the material they have learned in class. The objective of this class is to give practice time to students. Clinic is from 1:30-4:30 PM

Instructional mode

The Cypress Health Institute uses the following method of instruction. First the teach will discuss the work to be learned. The student uses their manual to follow along during the discussion. The teacher then demonstrates the material to be learned on an assistant. Students observe this demonstration and ask questions or follow along in their manual. Student's then pair up and the teacher leads the students through the previously demonstrated material. Students then practice the material themselves. After this, the students switch places and the instructor leads the second group of students through the previously demonstrated material. Students then practice the material themselves.

At the end of the practice time questions and answers are brought forward again. This teaching sequence is repeated for all new material.

Statement of educational objectives

The educational objectives of the Certified Massage Therapist 520 hour Program at Cypress Health Institute are to help students learn a broad range of physical manipulations and modalities, to know how and when to apply various strokes and techniques and to give a professional massage to each client. In addition, students are taught to focus life energy and channel it creatively for healing. Students are taught to give a nurturing massage and to help alleviate pain and provide other symptomatic relief. Another objective is to help students acquire insight into the dynamics of the healing process and an understanding of the underlying causes of disease. Students will also begin to understand anatomy, physiology and pathology of the human body with its structural and functional interrelationships. Students will learn the importance of obtaining and maintaining credentials, adhering to laws and regulations, ethical principals for massage therapists, standards of ethical practice, and compliance with the Massage Therapy Act applicable to CAMTC certified professionals. Finally, a student will begin to develop the self-confidence and intuitive freedom to trust his/her innate healing abilities.

Every semester, the Administrator for the Cypress Health Institute meets with each faculty member to create, review and/ or update course curriculum.

(b) To falsely state or advertise or put out any sign or card or other device, or to falsely represent to the public through any print or electronic media, that he or she or any other individual is licensed, certified, or registered by a governmental agency as a massage therapist or massage practitioner.
